DAILY ITINERARY

sunday, day one: Arrival—We recommend booking your travel into Queretaro México. It is the nearest international airport to San Miguel de Allende. Your tour leader will meet you at the airport and facilitate ground transportation to the hotel. The transfer time to San Miguel is approximately 90 minutes. Depending on your arrival time, travelers can become familiar with the surrounding area and enjoy a meal at a local restaurant. When booking your flight, please consider arranging for your arrival into by 4:30 PM. This will allow time to get to the hotel, freshen up, and attend the 7:00 PM welcome happy hour.

MONDAY, DAY TWO (B, L): We will enjoy a walking tour to the Central Jardin & La Parroquia in the vibrant heart of San Miguel de Allende. This walking tour will immerse you in the rich history, stunning architecture, and lively culture of this enchanting Mexican town.

Our next stop is the nearby historic **Museo Allende**, housed in an 18th-century mansion. This museum offers a glimpse into the life of Ignacio Allende, a key figure in Mexico's independence. We'll explore exhibits of artifacts, documents, and artworks that tell Allende's story and the region's broader history.

After our group lunch, we will walk 10 minutes to the nearby Plaza Cívica and the Church of Our Lady of Health. Plaza Cívica has been a central gathering place since the town's early days. It offers a look into the heart of San Miguel de Allende's historical and cultural essence.

The nearby The **Church of Our Lady of Health**, is a beautiful example of baroque architecture. Built in the 18th century, this church features a stunning façade adorned with intricate carvings and statues.

Our final stop of the day is the landmark **Biblioteca** Publica, the largest bilingual library in Mexico. It's not just a repository of books but a cultural hub that offers a unique glimpse into the town's community life. *The tour will host a get-acquainted happy hour at 6:30 PM at the hotel.*

TUESDAY, DAY THREE (B, L): Today, we take a 45-minute ride in our chartered van to the **Cañada de la Virgen Archaeological Site**, once home to the Otomi people from 540 to 1050 AD. This ancient ceremonial center is notable for its well-preserved pyramids, plazas, and burial mounds, showcasing advanced astronomical and architectural skills.

After a family-style lunch at the nearby Rancho del Xotola, we'll visit the **Otoni Rug Weavers**, a women's cooperative known for their colorful naïve folkart carpets and efforts to preserve their culture and traditions while providing for their families. Each rug showcases aspects of daily village life.

WEDNESDAY, DAY FOUR (B, D): Today we travel to the nearby **Colonial city of Guanajuato.** After our 90-minute drive, our first stop is the **Teatro Juárez**. Since its 1903 inauguration, this architectural gem has been the hub of the city's premier artistic events. We'll explore its majestic interior and learn about its rich history, stunning architecture, and unique decorations.

After lunch on your own in the charming Plza San Fernando, we will walk to the near-by short walk to the **Museo Diego Rivera**, located in the birthplace of the famed Mexican artist. Renowned for his murals and contributions to the Mexican muralism movement, the museum showcases Rivera's early sketches, paintings, and personal items.

Our last stop of the day is a short walk to the **MERCADO HIDALGO**. Inaugurated on September 16, 1910, it has been a vibrant part of the city's culture. Initially intended as a railway station, its impressive iron framework and large clock tower showcase a blend of neoclassical and Art Nouveau styles, making it a unique architectural landmark.

THURSDAY, DAY FIVE (B, L): We'll take a 15-minute walk to the Museo de Juguetes, which features a vast collection of traditional Mexican toys. This unique museum preserves the craftsmanship and cultural heritage of Mexican childhood, with many handmade toys showcasing intricate designs and vibrant colors.

Next, we'll walk 10 minutes to **Mercado de Artesanía**, a vibrant spot where local artisans sell handmade crafts like ceramics, textiles, jewelry, and metalwork. It's a great place for diverse shopping and supporting the local economy.

After our group lunch and you will have the afternoon at your leisure for independent exploration to see and do what interests you most. Your tour leaders will be available to provide you with various options.

FRIDAY, DAY SIX (B, L): Today, we'll travel 60 minutes to the town of Dolores Hidalgo, the birthplace of the Mexican War of Independence. On September 16, 1810, Miguel Hidalgo, a catholic priest issued the "Grito de Dolores" here, calling for the end of Spanish rule. Our first stop is the Parroquia de Nuestra Señora de Dolores, where this historic cry for independence was made.

After our church visit, we will walk 5 minutes to the modest **Museo de la Independencia**, opened in 2010 for Mexico's bicentennial. The museum offers exhibits on the independence movement, including artifacts, and documents as well as cultural elements like art, music, and traditions that evolved since the independence era.

After visiting the museum, we will board our chartered van for a short ride to a nearby winery, where we will have lunch and enjoy the view of vineyards and the countryside beyond.

Our next site is the **Sanctuary of Atotonilco**, founded in the 18th century and known as the "Sistine Chapel of Mexico." It was significant in the Mexican War of Independence, where Father Miguel Hidalgo used the Virgin of Guadalupe banner to rally his followers in 1810. The Sanctuary, an example of Mexican Baroque style, features intricate designs, domes, and altarpieces. It also houses a remarkable collection of murals and frescoes by Antonio Martínez de Pocasangre, depícting biblical scenes and appealing to art enthusiasts.

SATURDAY, DAY SEVEN (B, D): We begin our day with a brief ride to the neaby Centro Cultural Ignacio Ramírez-Escuela Bellas Artes. Once an 18th-century

convent, the building now serves as an art school and cultural center. It retains its historical charm while offering workshops, exhibitions, and performances. Notably, it houses David Alfaro Siqueiros's unique mural, "Vida y Obra del General Ignacio Allende," a significant piece in Mexican art that reflects themes of resistance, identity, and social justice.

Our next stop is **Fabrica Aurora**, a former textile factory from the early 1900s that was pivotal to the local economy until the 1990s. Now a cultural and artistic hub, it houses a delightful array of galleries, studios, shops, and cafes. It serves as a vibrant gathering place for artists and art enthusiasts, showcasing contemporary art, traditional crafts, and innovative design.

After lunch on your own and you will have the afternoon at your leisure for independent exploration to see and do what interests you most. Your tour leaders will be available to provide you with various options.

In the evening, we will enjoy our farewell dinner at a nearby restaurant.

SUNDAY, DAY EIGHT: We hope that this departure day will find you with many fond memories of your time in San Miguel de Allende. The tour will arrange your shuttle to the airport. When booking your return flight be sure to factor in the 90-minute ride from our hotel to Queretaro International Airport. (B)

PAYMENT DEADLINES

Registration will be accepted on a first-come, first-served basis with a AUGUST 20, 2025. A \$500.00 deposit is requested with your registration to secure your space on the tour. Let us know if you wish to pay using a credit card, let us know, and we will invoice you via PayPal. A 3.0% processing fee is applied to credit card payments. Final payment is due by OCTOBER 20, 2025.

We strongly recommend that you NOT make non-refundable travel arrangements until the tour is confirmed. The tour will be confirmed once the tour minimum of 10 is met or not later than OCTOBER 20, 2025. The \$500 deposit is fully refundable should the tour minimum not be met.

CANCELLATIONS AND REFUNDS: Cancellations must be in writing. Participants who cancel on or before NOVEMBER 20, 2024, will receive a full refund, less a \$95.00 processing fee. No refund can be made if a cancellation is made after that date. We cannot be responsible for losses due to non-refundable airline tickets or other travel arrangements. Travel insurance is highly recommended.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION: Every effort will be made to carry out all the tour activities as planned. However, in the event of unforeseen circumstances or events beyond our control, we reserve the right to make adjustments, modifications, or deletions to the itinerary and/or accommodations that may be deemed necessary. Passports must be valid for the entire duration of your stay in Mexico, with blank pages for immigration stamps.

TOUR Pace and Activity Level

If we had to rate the tour's activity and pace levels, overall, on a scale of 1 to 10, the activity would be a level 5-6; travelers should be able to leisurely walk 2 to 3 miles, which includes climbing one or two flights of stairs and walking over uneven pavement, or cobblestones. In addition, standing up for up to one to two hours may be required at some of the sites. Regarding the pace, on a scale of 1 to 10, the tour is moderate or level 5-6, with our itinerary typically including three sites daily, allowing for a 90-minute lunch/rest break. There are two evening outings planned on days 4 and 7. Most, if not all, the venues offer benches and seating should you need to rest for a few minutes or catch your breath. Throughout each day, there should be ample opportunities to purchase bottled water at tour sites, kiosks, and mini-marts, with regular restroom breaks at venues and restaurants.

The itinerary calls for departing the hotel each morning 9:00 AM and returning to the hotel between 5:00 and 5:30 PM daily.

IMPORTANT NOTE: Please take into account for the 2-hour transit time from San Miguel de Allende to the Querétaro International Airport when booking your return flight. This is in addition to the 2 to 3-hour airport arrival time airlines recommend for international flights.
